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





WSU College of Medicine celebrates first Match Day with virtual celebration

The WSU Elson S. Floyd College of Medicine hosted its first Match Day ceremony for the inaugural class of medical students on March 19.

Match Day is a major milestone for 4th year medical students in which the National Resident Matching Program notifies graduating medical students across the country about which residency program they have been "matched" to. For several months, students applied and interviewed for the coveted spots in their medical specialties of choice. At exactly 9 am

PST on the third Friday in March, every medical student across the nation learns where they will spend the next 3-7 years of their medical training.

The WSU College of Medicine virtual Match Day ceremony honored the college's first WSU medical students to be matched. Due to COVID-19, the celebration was held virtually in the evening. Earlier in the day, students received the news of where they matched for residency.




